"These pieces of usable art are handmade from reclaimed post-consumer plastics collected from local businesses and residents. Heat and pressure are used to melt multiple layers of plastics together in a



fusing process. This creates a thick and resilient base material which is then decorated with additional plastic cut-outs using a technique called "Plastic



Robin Messenheimer, a 16-year member of Hilo FCE, passed away on April 14, 2024 in Florida at the age of 79. She was a member of Puna Wahine FCE Club. She was an unsung, grassroots heroine! She served as secretary, historian and newsletter chair for Hilo Council as well as serving on and chairing many convention committees. She held several club officer positions over the years and coordinated her club's Zoom meetings, started during the Covid pandemic, so they could continue to meet regularly. Robin also volunteered to serve as "Tech Support" assistant for HAFCE Past

President, Katsuko Enoki. She was named <u>Hawaii FCE's Heart of FCE in 2021</u>. She was instrumental in helping the FCE Historical Materials committee get started. Her other community organizations that she devoted her time to was Zonta International, Hilo Toastmasters, Big Island Retired Military Association, Hawaii Island Palm Society, Hilo Orchid Society, and the Hawaii Concert Society, where she served as treasurer. Her favorite pastime was greeting card/scrapbook crafting. She shared her talents at many a Hilo FCE Fair and at workshops. She was an avid bridge player as well as chess player and loved birding and photography. She and her husband lost their home and lovely gardens to lava during the 2018 volcano eruption in Leilani Estates - Puna. They moved into Hilo for a while and eventually moved to Florida in 2020 to be closer to family but she remained a devoted FCE member. She is survived by her husband, Harry, her son Andrew, her step-daughter Carrie, 4 grandchildren, and 3 siblings.

Shimomi Araujo Memorial



Shimomi Araujo passed away on June 3, 2024. She was 98 years old and was a 70-year member of LHK FCE Club. She was the perpetual president of her club, was an avid FCE state and national convention attendee, excellent cook, and seamstress extraordinaire! She was Hawaii's "Heart of FCE" in 2006. The following was contributed by her daughter, Elizabeth:

"Shimomi had 5 children, 4 boys and 1 girl. She is survived by Daughter Elizabeth (Roger) Toledo, Son Clayton (Terrie Saito) Araujo, 8 grandchildren, 14 great grandchildren and 2 or 3 great great

grandchildren. Her 3 oldest sons Peter Archie Araujo (53 yrs.), George Ernest "Ernie" Araujo (37 yrs.), and Lawrence Kei Araujo (69 yrs.) predeceased her. As difficult as these 3 deaths were for her, she was resilient. Their pictures hung in her living room and she faithfully visited gravesites on birthdays and death anniversaries. She instructed Clayton to carry on with those visits! She is the last surviving of her Arai family, her oldest brother Toichi Arai passed away November of 2021. He was 97 years old. She had the worst birth date, December 26, 1925, Day after Christmas! We were always partied out by then but we still had celebrations! Always had to be ON that date too!! NEVER early, late maybe a day or two but no more. She was a member of the Hilo Seventh-day Adventist Church since 1958. She was a very active member, participated in many church events, everyone loved her food for potlucks and in her younger days she held many leadership roles. Being the most senior member, she was dearly beloved by all. She worked at Kamehameha Garments in Hilo for many (?) years - had many lifelong friends from there too. Uncle Billy's Hotel gift shop/Hawaiian wear was named for her. Shimomi's Garment Factory at Uncle Billy's Hotel was her favorite job - probably because she was the Boss! The Kimi family took her in as one of their own and was part of the family all those years and even after she retired. Uncle Billy Kimi was a smart man who knew how to best utilize her many talents. She loved getting

to know so many people from Hilo while there, as she and her team sewed school band and ukelele band uniforms, even uniforms for the County Band. Then there were the halaus and the prom dresses; even wedding and bride's maids dresses. There was not an outfit she could not make. Honestly, I never ever heard a complaint on anything she made. She was quite the perfectionist! She was a 70-year member of FCE. I will be 74 and I know she always said I was 5 when we moved to Lanakila and she joined Lanakila U.E. (the name in those days). So FCE has been a part of my life as long as I can recall, her club members and their kids have been lifelong friends. She credits FCE for learning so much on how to take care of her family and taught her many many everyday things she would never have known if not for FCE. She loved FCE more than anything. She was able to travel and she went to MANY national conventions and would brag that she had been to almost all 50 states, mainly due to FCE conventions. She met many ladies that grew into long friendships and they would look for each other at each convention. When we were kids, the State convention was her annual vacation away from the 5 of us! All the many little things she brought home were like little treasures she would share with the 5 of us. The many Christmas parties and Club events were great for the whole family. The Lanakila Club members became our family - Aunties and Uncles I have wonderful memories of too!!"

Since 1979, MAFCE has awarded \$196,700 to 143 students. Starting in 1979, five students received \$200 each. The award was increased to \$500, then \$1,000 and currently \$2,000. With today's \$10,000 award, MAFCE will have awarded \$206,700 to 148 students! These scholarships were made possible from our cook books sales. MAFCE printed and sold the yellow, green, red, blue, gold, and the 50th Anniversary cookbook. Unfortunately, we no longer print these cookbooks due to the rising costs. Proceeds from the sale of these cookbooks are used for the scholarships.

JACQUELINE MALY'S ACHIEVEMENT REWARDS FOR COLLEGE SCIENTISTS



At a recent awards dinner for ARCS - Achievement Rewards for College Scientists, Jacquie received the Angle Award. It honors not only financial contributions to the program but also her active participation as well. The organization honors each year the outstanding member of the Board of directors. Having served for two years as Board President, she received that award in the past. ARCS National Board has announced a third possible award – the Spark Plug. She is waiting to see the criteria for that, as well as what the trophy would look like – a real mounted



spark plug on a plaque perhaps?

LEI MAKING



Members were treated to a lei making class in keeping in tune with the graduation season. Due to Jeanette Pang's admittance to the hospital, Pat stepped in to teach her program. Members were taught to make a braided ribbon lei. Supplies and tools needed were two different 10-yard spools of satin ribbon (white and green) and scissors.

Pulling at least 6-8 inches of each ribbon free from the spool, decide which ribbon you'll start with. This is now ribbon 1. Make a slip knot in ribbon 1. Make a little bunny ear-

style loop 6-8 inches along ribbon 2. Insert loop 2 through look 1, pull loop 1 tight. It should be snug against loop 2 but should not cause any creasing.

Using the longer, spool end of ribbon 1, make a loop. Insert this new loop through the loop in ribbon 2. Pull ribbon 2 tight. Fold a new loop in ribbon 2, insert it through the loop in ribbon 1. Pull ribbon 1 snug. You should start to see a checkerboard pattern developing. Repeat until you have your desired length. You can make the lei as long or short as you'd like. (Most lei are about a yard.) when you're happy with the length, cut your ribbons, leaving at least 6-8 inches free or more if you want a bow. Once the ribbons are cut, pull the tail end of the last loop all the way through to finish off the braid and tie a knot. Tie the two ends of the lei together. Finish off with a bow.
