National FCE membership was put on the agenda for the Annual Meeting held in September. Membership forms were made and information about NAFCE was made available to all attendees. They outlined specific benefits of supporting the National organization by becoming a member and introduced the Legacy Fund. They announced the Alumni Scholarship of 10 first timers to the conference in 2025.

They reported speaking to their members about the National and State Project in support of the Food Security project with education and action and their goals for the third year of this ongoing project. They are educating by sharing material available about Food Waste, access to quality produce and volunteering at Food Banks. They are going to work with the extension office to offer classes for young mothers and home makers concerning shopping, where to shop, how to shop, what fresh and whole foods are better quality as opposed to processed foods.

They also shared all the information regarding FCL classes with the State Board. They have signed up to teach several classes regarding Food Waste at the Leadership Retreat in the Spring.

National FCE is excited to announce that starting in 2025, there will be a National FCE High School Age CHARACTER COUNTS!® Essay Contest. During the National FCE Conference several states indicated that they would support participation in this National High School Age Essay Contest. The theme for the 2025 Essay Contest is **TRUSTWORTHINESS.**



Throughout the years there have been discussions across the USA about producing some way of involving and introducing young adults into the National Association for Family and Community Education (FCE). FCE across the nation has been suffering from membership loss and we all needed to find a way of inviting young people into FCE. Throughout the years, 4th grade students were introduced to FCE through the National 4th Grade Essay and Artwork contest. This is one way to introduce and invite young adults into FCE.

Some of the basics of the Contest include:

- Using the generic Essay Contest Forms, which are located on the National FCE website, each State will need to set up and conduct their own State Essay Contest
- Each State will need to provide any monetary awards for their State Essay Contest award winners.

- Each State will submit their 1st Place winner's essay and forms to National FCE on/before **April 1, 2025**.
- The contest is open to all High School Age students.
- The contest must use the current 2025 rules and be written on the theme of TRUSTWORTHINESS.
- The contest can be completed at home, school, church or wherever.
- The contest must be done following all the complete rules as listed in the contest forms packet.
