<u>Program/Project Activity Report</u>: the form for this report can be found on the website.

From the home page, click on the "Resource Library" at the bottom of the page. On the left side of the page are "State Resources" and this information and form are about 3/4th down from the top. Only the first page needs to be sent in, BUT if you want to add a second page please be very brief in what programs or projects were done in your state. These numbers are very helpful when the annual report is written. There is no monitory reward to report.



Program Award Book: Website home page, then "Resource Library" and on the left side under "State Resources" the forms for this can be found. Categories that an award book can be submitted in include Education, Leadership and Action. Vouchers for conference registration for next year's conference are awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in each of the three categories. Look at the judging sheet to be aware of what is looked at when the judging is done. Please attached the required page for page 1. If a display board and/or a brochure are not included, then 5 points will be taken off when judged.



BAKE AND TAKE DAY/MONTH

Bake and Take Month started with Bake and Take Day in 1970 as a community service project of the Kansas Wheathearts in Sumner County. The Kansas Wheathearts, an auxiliary organization of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, set out to share baked goods with family members, friends, neighbors, and those in need, generating goodwill in the community. The idea of a community member sharing a favorite recipe with someone



special became so successful that the Kansas Wheathearts created a national Bake and Take Day celebration in 1973. Although the Kansas Wheathearts disbanded in 2001, the tradition continues to be supported by the wheat industry. While a month long celebration might not be the right fit for some, Bake and Take Day, celebrated annually on the fourth Saturday in March, is a great opportunity for families and service groups to get together in the kitchen and around the oven.

Giving a home-baked gift is a great way to show someone you care. For more than 40 years, Bake and Take Month has been an opportunity to celebrate relationships with friends and family by baking and sharing treats.

"The personal visit to members of the community is as rewarding and important as the baked goods you take them."

Prepare gifts of fresh-baked wheat foods for relatives, friends, co-workers, neighbors and just about anyone who likes to eat. The visit when you deliver the baked goods is one of the most enjoyable aspects!

2026 4th Grade Essay and Artwork contest

I would like to tell you a little about the Essay and Artwork contest open to 4th grade students. The contest is based on CHARACTER COUNTS! ® and the 6 Pillars of Character and is open to any 4th grader attending public or private school, homeschooler, scout, 4-H or church group. This National FCE contest promotes literacy programs, CHARACTER COUNTS! ® and community involvement.

The 2026 theme encourages understanding and practicing "RESPECT" and strive for excellence and creativity in reading, writing, and drawing skills. The CHARACTER COUNTS! ® says Respect is treating others with kindness and consideration.

Starting out

Start at the county level and the contest can be run from September 1, 2025, until March 1, 2026 (you have some flexibility with the dates as long as the State entry is



postmarked to National FCE by April 15th, 2026). You can award prizes and recognition to the local and county winners for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places. Each county can forward the original essay and artwork of the 1st place winners to the State FCE Essay and Artwork Chairperson by the state deadline. For the National FCE level please make sure your original essay and artwork 1st place winners reaches National FCE postmarked by the April 15th deadline.

More Information:

Start your contest at the county level, include the essay and hand drawn artwork. The student can use a #2 pencil or computer type for the essay. The student may use a #2 pencil and color pencils for the hand drawn artwork. NO CRAYONS OR MARKERS AND DO NOT FOLD THE ARTWORK. You will find the criteria for the contest, the letter to the teacher/parent/leader, the permission form, the press release and the judging form on the National FCE website. 2026 National FCE High School Age CHARACTER COUNTS!® Essay Contest

National FCE is excited to announce that in 2026, there will again be a National FCE High School Age CHARACTER COUNTS!® Essay Contest. This will be the second year for the Contest. The theme for the 2026 Essay Contest is **RESPECT**, which is the same theme that the 4th Grade Essay and Artwork Contest will be using.



Some of the basics of the Contest include:

- Using the generic Essay Contest Forms, which will be located on the National FCE website, each State will need to set up and conduct their own State Essay Contest.
- Each State will need to provide any monetary awards for their State Essay Contest award winners.
- The suggested deadline for State Contests is March 1, 2026, which is give the states time to judge their contest and submit their 1st place winner to National FCE.
- Each State will submit their 1st Place winner's essay and forms to National FCE on/before **April 1, 2026**.
- The contest is open to all High School Age students.
- The contest must use the current 2026 rules and be written on the theme of RESPECT.
- The contest can be completed at home, school, church or wherever.
- The contest must be done following all the complete rules as listed in the contest forms packet.

All of the forms and information for the 2026 National FCE High School Age CHARACTER COUNTS!® Essay Contest will be located on the National FCE website https://www.nafce.org/resourcelibrary These are generic forms and will need to be formatted for each State Contest.

EGGS

Substitutes for Baking

- ❖ Silken Tofu ~ ¼ cup
- ❖ Yogurt ~ ¼ cup
- 1 ripe banana
- 1 tablespoon Flaxseed + 3 tablespoons water
- ❖ Applesauce ~ ¼ cup
- ❖ Mashed Avocado ¼ cup
- ❖ Aquafaba ~ 3 Tablespoons (liquid from chickpeas)
- Arrowroot Powder ~ 1 tablespoon + 2 tablespoons water
- ❖ Vinegar and Baking Soda ~ 1 tablespoon vinegar + 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ❖ Commercial Egg Replacers ~ follow package instructions
- Chia Seeds ~ 1 tablespoon chia seeds + 3 tablespoons water
- ❖ Potato Starch ~ 1 tablespoon + 2 tablespoons water

When using these substitutes, keep the following in mind:

- Reduce liquid content in the recipe if using a wet substitute.
- Adjust leavening agents (baking powder/baking soda) for better texture.
- Some substitutes may affect the flavor, so adjust accordingly.

Hope this helps.
